Year 6

- 69 pupils (37 boys, 32 girls), 23 DA, 11 SEND
- One disapplied pupil
- % of PPS pupils achieving expected standard was the highest among Trust primaries

Reading

- 84% pupils achieved expected in Reading (2022 national 74%, PPS 2021 78%)
- 23% achieved greater depth (2019 national 27%, PPS 2021 28%). Greater depth national 2022 has not yet been released
- 70% of the DA cohort achieved expected and 17% greater depth
- 45% of the SEND cohort achieved expected but 0% achieved greater depth

C: (LH) Reading has been the big success at Penshurst this year.

Writing

- 70% pupils achieved expected in Writing (2022 national 69%, PPS 2021 73%)
- 1% achieved greater depth (2019 national 20%, PPS 2021 5%)
- 61% of the DA cohort achieved expected
- 27% of the SEND cohort achieved expected

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C: (JS) Writing has had the biggest hit since Covid. National has dropped to 69% - everyone is lower in writing. 27% SEND achieved expected and 78% non- SEND achieved expected; there is so much need that SEND will be the number one focus for next year.

Q: (CT) Are you in line with forecasts?

JS: Yes, SEN writing is on the ADP as we realise it needs to be a focus. There is a lot of need around dyslexia.

Q: (AF) How many pupils missed the standard?

LH: 14

Q: (AF) How many SEN pupils missed the standard?

LH: 8 out of 11.

Q: (GS) How is writing moderated?

JS: By the LA - they choose 25% of schools. All the Trust primaries were moderated this time.

Q: (CT) Was there a difference in expected and moderated?

JS: We put some borderline pupils down as the moderators did not like one of the features of our marking.

Q: (CT) Can anything be learned from Croxby if 78% pupils achieved expected?

LH: Penshurst was moderated first, and our advice helped Croxby.

C: (JS) I would like to say that I have had a meeting with the chief moderator regarding our writing moderation. I asked for a meeting as he opened two books, saw annotation, shut the books and spoke of malpractice amongst the Year 6 staff. We had a re-moderation and were told we were one of the strongest schools for providing breadth and balance. In the meeting with the chief moderator, he gave me a verbal apology and stated that he knew PPS was operating at a very high level.

Q: (AF) Only one child achieved GD. Do you feel you put all your energy into basics, and would you do that again or would you push others more to achieve GD?

JS: We wanted to put more into GD but the moderators disagreed.

Maths

- 71% pupils achieved expected in maths (2022 national 71%, PPS 2021 75%)
- 13% achieved greater depth (2019 national 27%, PPS 2021 12%)
- 52% of the DA cohort achieved expected and 9% greater depth
- 36% of the SEND cohort achieved expected but 0% achieved greater depth

C: (KK) These results are remarkable when you consider that in the first half term only 30% were achieving expected standard. We do not have the scaled scores so you cannot see the progress; if we did, you would see the extent of the progress as the pupils were low at KS1. I would like to see compulsory homework, more booster sessions and more work developing the aspirations of girls in maths as only 59% girls achieved expected and 81% boys in maths.

C: (MPr) Applying maths to real world situations would help so that the children can see the value in learning maths.

JS: We have started mastery maths in EYFS, and we are now seeing strong EYFS and Year 1 maths results. Strong basics will serve well for KS2.

C: (EL) Year 1 were looking really good on transition day.

C: (RP) Comparing to 2019 national is comparing these children to the ones in ideal circumstances.

JS: We have compared to last year's actual and 2022 national where we have these figures.

C: (AF) It is good to see comparisons across other Trust schools. We have achieved 71%maths against 69% at Croxby and 57% at Keyingham. Well done all.

C: (JS) This Year 6 has been the hardest year group to teach out of all my years of teaching. We have gained so many in year transfers – many with significant need. The year group is very boy heavy, DA heavy and SEND heavy. Year 6 teachers have done a brilliant job; I am so proud. AF: Please pass on our congratulations to all the teachers.

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Year 2

- 69 pupils (39 boys, 30 girls), 20 DA, 16 SEND
- 71% pupils achieved expected in reading, 71% in writing and 77% in maths
- No national data until autumn
- Reading: 60% DA achieved expected compared to 78% non- DA. 25% SEND achieved expected compared to 87% non - SEND
- Writing: 50% DA achieved expected compared to 80% non- DA. 13% SEND achieved expected compared to 89% non SEND
- Maths: 65% DA achieved expected compared to 82% non- DA. 38% SEND achieved expected compared to 89% non - SEND
- 5 DA in the Den have significant needs with a couple close to exclusion

C: (LH) All national comparators were down, excluding reading.

JS: Reading was the easiest to home teach. PPS had the best Year 2 results out of the Trust primaries

Q: (CT) Do schools that have done well share best practice?

JS: Yes - we work together.

Year 1

- Year 1 phonics 78% pass rate (2019 national was 82%)
- Year 2 re-take 93% pass

C: (HK) Of the 15 that didn't achieve phonics 4 are in the Den.

Q: (CT) Why is national data not available until autumn?

JS: No known reason

Q: (AF) Are pupils in the Den for short periods?

JS: No – this is not nurture provision anymore, it is SEN provision. We need a SEN expert to look at the Den as a specialist provision. We have behaviour needs in there too as there is nowhere else to send them.

Q: (AF) What is the maximum number of children in the Den?

JS: 8 for good practice. It is an area to look at; ideally we have a SEN area and a behaviour area that is separate.

EYFS

- 67% achieved Good Level of Development (GLD) from 5 areas of learning (national 2019 72%)
- 57% DA achieved GLD
- 50% boys achieved GLD and 84% girls
- No national average available until April 2023

Q: (AF) How does the Keyingham cohort compare?

JS: They are very different. KPS is on a journey to quality of education. Our pupils come in below Croxby pupils.

HK: The baseline in autumn 2021 was 22% so we are really pleased with the progress. Literacy increased from 26% in September to 79% and maths increased from 30% in September to 76%. There is still a gap in literacy of 15% (67% DA achieved compared to 82%). There is also an obvious issue with boys – only 67% achieved in literacy and 60% in maths compared to 93% girls in literacy and 94% in maths. This links to boys' attendance as it is low. Our boys' average attendance is 82%.

Q: (AF) How will you improve next year?

HK: There will be more home learning. We will work to raise the expectations and attendance, particularly of the boys. We have worked with Year 1 leaders to highlight the concerns.

C: (JS) Covid had a major impact on attendance and punctuality; children have become used to being off.

Q: (CT) Has there been a drop in attendance this week (last week of term)?

AP: Yes

JS: Some have taken term time holidays, and some have had holidays during transition weeks which would have been unheard of in previous years.

Q: (CT) Do you visit parents of pupils joining FS2?

HK: We home visit those joining our nursery and any new pupils to FS2.

C: (JS) This has been a real year of change with several staff on maternity and working from home at 28 weeks. We have 8 ECTs next year. I must congratulate Zoe Walker and Emma Fox for their impact on lower abilities. We have spoken lots about the Covid impact on the older children, but the younger ones have lost out on language development and social interaction. Ther attention span is less; they have been more affected than the older children.

C: (MPr) Our Read Write Inc specialist is doing training for staff on 5 September which we are all looking forward to.

C: (JS) The high number of ECTs next year will lead to a lack of wiggle room for cover. Most classes will be without a TA in the afternoons as the TAs will be covering ECT times. We have lost lots of experienced staff and replaced with ECTs which are cheaper so there is the potential there to use money to have more cover. The PAN is dropping so we cannot afford to offer permanent contracts.

C: (BM) That is a problem as very few staff apply for fixed term contracts. We need to pick this up again at a later meeting.

Q: (CT) What has been the level of staff absence?

JS: Really high, due to Covid, number on maternity leave and sickness.

Q: (CT) Is it the same staff taking short term absence?

JS: No

Q: (AF) How many parents come in to help with reading?

JS: One.

C: (AF) Thank you and your staff again – these are really strong results. We always look for improvements, but they are very positive.

70 SPORTS PREMIUM STRATEGY

The Strategy had been completed to show the impact and cost of the actions over the year.

Q: (AF) What happens if we spend more than the allocated premium?

JS: It comes off my budget.

C: (BM) To have only 60% that can swim 25 metres seems very low.

JS: They are a very low standard at swimming. We cannot tell the staff to go into the pool but from next year they will be asked to sit on the side and encourage the children.

Q: (AF) Lots of impact has been listed – will any strategies be dropped next year?

JS: Everything has worked but we do need to improve our links with the local community.

Q: (AF) What are the funds for 2022/23?

JS: That is not known as yet.

JS: We couldn't match fund as it has increased to 50% next year.
